“ I met Tom and Karen about a year and a half ago, shortly after we bought the condo across from theirs. From the very beginning, it felt easy—like we had known each other longer than we had. We connected quickly over our shared love of tools, hard work, and Michigan State. (Go Green, Go White.)

When I learned that Tom had leukemia and that his time was limited, I was shocked and deeply saddened. Watching him work around his home and yard, you never would have known what he was facing. He stayed active, positive, and determined, meeting his illness with quiet strength, courage, and grace.

Tom was the kind of neighbor everyone hopes for, but few are lucky enough to have. He was always ready to help—whether that meant lending a tool, jumping into a project in my yard, or simply talking through the best way to get something done. Any time I was outside working, it seemed like Tom would appear, either offering a hand or sharing advice born from experience. And when he wasn't working, I'd often see him relaxing on his patio, listening to his favorite music or cheering on the Spartans. Those small, everyday moments are the ones I'll remember most.

One moment that really captures who Tom was stands out to me. I wanted to remove a tree stump, and Tom didn't just offer to lend me his chainsaw—he offered his chain saw but discovered it wasn't working so he go in his car and took it to Weingard's to have it repaired so we could finish the job together. In the winter, we shoveled snow and cleared our sidewalks and driveways side by side, we a shared understanding and the simple bond of being good neighbors.

Tom's faith was an important part of who he was. He believed deeply in God, and that faith shaped how he lived and how he faced the end of his life. He remained faithful until the very end.

Tom was more than a neighbor, he was a true friend—a helper, a
